We in the University of Kansas division of music theory invite applications for our PhD program in music theory. We also anticipate **2–3 openings for graduate teaching assistantships**. In addition to a full tuition waiver, the assistantship comes with a yearly stipend of \$14,200. Every graduate teaching assistant in music theory serves as instructor of record for their own sections of music theory, aural skills, and other courses as determined by availability and interest.

For applicants already holding a Masters degree in music theory, **we offer a three-year PhD program**, allowing students holding an assistantship to complete their degree fully funded. Our curriculum is flexible, and largely determined by an individual student's interest. Students may take courses in musicology and composition as part of the degree program, and students often enroll in classes outside of music, such as courses in American Studies with Dr. Sherrie Tucker.

The three of us in music theory exhibit a wide breadth of specializations:

- **Dr. Scott Murphy** (Professor of Music Theory): Film Music Theory and Analysis, Models of Meter, Classical Tonal Theory
- **Dr. Brad Osborn** (Associate Professor of Music Theory): Popular Music, Music Videos, Form, Timbre
- **Dr. Alan Street** (Associate Professor of Music Theory): Aesthetics and Critical Theory, Music and Narrative, The Second Viennese School

Formerly a member of the teaching staff at Keele and Exeter universities, UK, and University College Dublin, Alan has also held research posts at Clare College, University of Cambridge, and Yale University (where he worked with Allen Forte). From 2008-09 he was Visiting Slee Professor of Music Theory at SUNY Buffalo, and in 2016 was elected to a Visiting Research Fellowship at Clare Hall, University of Cambridge. A member of the advisory board of the journal Music Analysis, he served as editor from 2005-11, and latterly as associate editor (2012-17). The author of numerous articles on aspects of musical and critical theory, his forthcoming published work includes a contribution to the symposium Stravinsky in Context, edited by Graham Griffiths (Cambridge University Press).
